Our Sergeant-at-Arms, **Pat Jeffries**, levied fines on **Charles Nobel, Tom Mills, Jerry Nethers, and Jim and Jean Murray**. He also fined everybody who was happy with the outcome of last night's BCS game, everybody who was not happy and everybody who didn't care one way or the other.

Program:

Craig Young introduced our speaker, Sherm Byers.

Sherm is the owner of the Burning Tree Golf Course and the AAA Pro Shop in Heath. In December 1989, he decided to expand a lake on his course. In the process of enlarging the lake, a drag line got caught on the top of the Mastodon's skull. Within an hour they uncovered a tusk. The first thing he did was cover it up and called his lawyer. He had just read about a state highway project which was shut down because they had uncovered some Indian remains. His lawyer assured him that the

mastodon was found on his property so it was his.

He called Brad Lepper at the Ohio Historical Society, who came over to look at it. He wanted them to cover it up and wait until spring. They, instead, started immediately. A normal dig will take between 6 months to two years. They took the entire mastodon out of the ground in two days.

They called museums to get help in putting it together. The best estimate they got was that it would take 6 months and cost \$40,000. Sherm decided that he and his mechanic could do it themselves. He went to the library and got a book that had a mastodon skeleton in it. It took them 30 days. A specialist from Texas helped Sherm build molds for every bone so that they could be replicated. The project took over 5 months to do and cost \$80,000.

The Burning Tree Mastodon turned out to be significant find in many ways. In fact, *Discover* named it one of the top 50 science discoveries of 1990. Besides being one of the most complete mastodon skeletons found (95 percent of the bones were recovered), its stomach contained eight species of live bacteria once thought to be extinct. It is the oldest living bacteria ever discovered.

DNA from its intestinal material is currently being sequenced so that it can be compared to DNA of present-day African and Asian elephants. Also, when they were cleaning the bones, they found some ribs with cut marks. Dan Fisher took them back to the University of Michigan and put them under an electron microscope. He found flint knappings in the markings. That means that the mastodon was killed by humans with spear.

That's important for two reasons. The mastodon was carbon-dated at 11,600 years old. The conventional wisdom was that humans crossed the Bering Strait about 12,000 years ago. They could not have migrated into Ohio in 400 years so they must have crossed over much earlier. It was also the first proof that humans could kill a mastodon with spears.

One of the Burning Tree Mastodon reproductions is on display in the basement of the golf course club house on Ridgely Tract Road along with 75 dinosaurs.
