From Advocate archives

Our Futures in Licking County is countywide plan to create a healthier community, particularly among youths, increase parental involvement with children and provide a skilled and talented work force. The initiative uses resources from United Way, the Licking County Community Mental Health and Recovery Board, a grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration and a one-year contract with Dr. Dennis Embry, author and expert on health, safety and abuse issues affecting children. Lew Mollica, a former Granville Schools superintendent, is coordinating the initiative. "If we are successful, we can prominently and profoundly affect Licking County for the better," Mollica told the board members. "I want you to help us identify the critical issues that need to be addressed in Licking County." The initiative was formed partially based on concerns identified in the United Way's Community Blueprint, a two-year assessment from 2005 to 2007.

Bernadette Collins gave her three-minute talk. She and her husband, Rob, were born and raised in Pittsburgh and are huge Steelers fans. She graduated from Duquesne University. When she came to central Ohio for a job, she and her husband settled in Newark because it is much like the suburbs of Pittsburgh where she grew up. They have an eleven year old daughter, who is going to Blessed Sacrament School. She believes strongly about The Rotary motto, "Service Above Self" and closed with this: What will matter is not what you bought but what you built - not what you got but what you gave - not your success but your significance - not what you learned but what you taught. What will matter is every act of compassion, integrity, courage or sacrificed that enriched, empowered or encouraged others to emulate your example. What will matter is not your competence but your character. What will matter is not how many people you knew, but how many will feel a lasting loss when you are gone. What will matter is not your memories but the memories that live in those you love - how long you will be remembered, by whom and for what. Living a life of significance does not happen by accident – it's not a matter of circumstance but of choice. ... Well said - even though it did cost you a buck.

Sergant-At-Arms:

Pat Jeffries fined **Bernadette Collins** for exceeding her allotted 3 minutes, Steelers fans that applauded, visiting Rotarian Skip Lorenzen, **David Trautman**, **Tony Adams**, **Dan DeLawder**, **Jon Spahr**, **Jerry Nethers**, and **Rev. Charles Noble** (40 years in the pulpit). Pat concluded with a story: Two Scientists, one from Russia and one from Czechoslovakia came to the United States to study our grizzly bears. They disappeared in an area where a mating pair of grizzlies had been reported. When the female grizzly attacked a ranger, it was shot and the Russian scientist was found

inside. When asked about the other scientist, the park service ranger concluded that the Czech was in the male.

Program:

Rob Klinger introduced our speaker, Professor John Hancock, who has taught Architectural Design, Theory and History at the University of Cincinnati since 1978. His articles on architectural history and interpretation have been published internationally. As a result of his studies of the ancient earthworks on Ohio, Professor Hancock came to the conclusion that we have the makings of remarkable cultural heritage tourism experience comparable to ones he had researched in places like France, England and Greece. A number of organizations are working together to develop "The Ancient Ohio Trail," a tourist's resource that will attract people from all over the world and inform them of historically important destinations that are found in central and southern Ohio. The first sentence on the home page of www.ancientohiotrail.org says, "Immerse yourself in the Heartland of Ancient America, where spectacular cultures created the largest concentration of geometric earthen architecture in the world."

Besides the Web site, which is up and running and will be continually developed, the group has developed "lure cards" (the cards you see in racks in hotels to promote a tourist site). There are also virtual tours and interpretations available on CD-ROMs which are for sale. Another goal is to provide a tourist with a "curated experience", that is, information on "where the good stuff is", how to get there, where to stay, where to eat, etc. Four of Ohio's sites, including Newark's are in the process of becoming UNESCO World Heritage sites which will greatly increase world interest in them. Part of that process is to develop an interpretive plan which "the Ancient Ohio Trail" is. Another reason for developing this program is to be ready for the influx of tourists. They plan to make animated tours, some of which have already been developed, available for download on iPhones to enhance a visitor's understanding of what they are looking at.

Eventually the plan may include guide books, brochures and more virtual tours. The target date for completion of the project is the Spring of 2012.
