This week's Program: OSU President E. Gordon Gee

Dr. E. Gordon Gee is president of The Ohio State University, a world-class public research institution and one of the nation's most distinguished land-grant universities. As chief executive officer, he oversees Ohio State's six campuses, 64,000 students, and nearly 40,000 faculty and staff. Gee is among the most highly experienced and respected leaders in higher education, having been named in 2009 by *Time* magazine as one of the top 10 university presidents in the United States. Prior to his service at Ohio State, he led Vanderbilt University (2001-07), Brown University (1998-00), The Ohio State University (1990-97), the University of Colorado (1985-90), and West Virginia University (1981-85). Born in Vernal, Utah, Gee graduated from the University of Utah with an honors degree in history and earned his J.D. and Ed.D degrees from Columbia University. He clerked under Chief Justice David T. Lewis of the U.S. 10th Circuit Court of Appeals before being named a judicial fellow and staff assistant to the U.S. Supreme Court. In this role, he worked for Chief Justice Warren Burger on administrative and legal problems of the Court and federal judiciary. Gee returned to Utah as an associate professor and associate dean in the J. Reuben Clark Law School at Brigham Young University, and was granted full professorship in 1978. One year later, he was named dean of the West Virginia University Law School, and, in 1981, was appointed to that university's presidency.

Last Week's Meeting

President Gary Baker opened the meeting. **Tom Slater** led the club in R-O-T-A-R-Y and in singing "When Rotarians Go Marching In." **Past President Steve Ehret** led the invocation and pledge.

Introduction of Guests:

President-Elect Laura Lewis led the Club in welcoming Visiting Rotarians George Spangler (Lancaster) and Damon Kuhn (Logan) as well as Bob Fitzgerald, guest of **Gary Baker**.

Tom Marcelain introduced Utica High School Vice Principal Nick Elam and read the bios of student guests Amanda Broseus and Hannah Tomcison.

Announcements:

President Gary, adorned in an Otterbein t-shirt consistent with Saturday's Rotary Auction "Back to School" theme, noted that college attire and jeans were in line with the theme as well. He encouraged 100% participation through attendance, donation of items, or some other form. He also recognized **Rob Montagnese** (in absentia) with the gift of a Team-Up-North sweatshirt. The recognition was in thanks to him and LMH for in-kind contribution of food and catering for the auction.

Corey Wills was proposed as a new member.

President Gary encouraged use of the sign-up sheets for the Oct. 25 Club meeting with E. Gordon Gee and added, "Wear a bowtie, if you please." To that, a bowtie-clad **John Weaver** chimed in, "I please."

President Gary also reminded members of upcoming activities, including the Club's 95th Year Celebration on the evening of Dec. 6 at Moundbuilders Country Club, special needs bowling which is in need of volunteers, and the Career Fair which in need of sponsors. He also remarked on a note from **Don Gunnerson** who is hoping for a recovery that allows his return to the Club soon.

Sergeant-at-Arms: Pat Jeffries fined **Don Ellington, Rick Platt, Glenn Abel**, all those not planning to attend the Rotary Auction, and Wisconsin Badger alums, including **Mel Ree** and Prosecutor Ken Oswald. His joke about autopsies (yes, a joke about autopsies) was followed with an auctioning off of two tickets to the Oct. 29 Wisconsin game with **Jeff Lawyer** the winning bidder.

Program:

The day's speaker was introduced by **Tom Marcelain**. Ken Oswald, Licking County Prosecuting Attorney, was distinguished for his service to Licking County since 1987 and for having served as co-counsel on the first case in Ohio gaining a conviction using

forensic DNA.

Oswald opened by equating the prosecutor's office role to "firefighters." He fit the term, figuratively, saying his office finds itself "constantly putting out fires for other people."

He discussed the three divisions of his office, Adult Felony, Juvenile, and Civil. All adult felony-level cases in Licking County are prosecuted through his office. All cases, felony and otherwise, involving juveniles also flow through his office. Lastly, civil matters. Those ranging from public contracts to local government legal representation, are also under his jurisdiction. All 25 townships in the County, comprising 100 elected officials, are his clients, for example. The diversity of matters makes his office, not unlike all the other county prosecutors' offices in Ohio, more diverse than any law firm in the state.

Further making the case for that figurative firefighter role, he recited a litany of unscheduled items that had come to his plate for attention just that morning alone: a double homicide in Pataskala, a victim's request to dismiss a pending domestic violence case, an employment issue, an appellate court issue, and a topic of the Licking County Commissioners' Thursday agenda.

From his 24 ½ years in Licking County, he spoke about Licking County and trends he's noticed in that time. The use of DNA evidence was one trend with the point made by showing two faces of convicts, both DNA cases. One was of a person found guilty of murder in 1998 on DNA evidence, the first of its kind in Licking County and Ohio. The second was of the latest person convicted on DNA evidence in Licking County.

He bemoaned the "CSI Effect" as another trend noticed. He labeled CSI and other crime shows a "prosecutor's nightmare" for the fact that they spoil the juror pool, which expects more of forensic evidence than can realistically be accomplished, and give criminals ideas for techniques to better cover their tracks. His recommendation for a courtroom drama show worth watching was the sitcom *Night Court*.

Computer-based crimes were the last trend cited. The crimes in this category run the gamut from forged prescriptions and identity fraud to "sexting" (illicit text messages) and cyber bullying.

He concluded with an examination of the reactive nature of our laws and the need for prosecutors to get creative to exact prosecution on matters before the law catches up with the crime trends. He specifically mentioned the diversion program created for "sexting" offenses as a more viable way to handle an issue for which no clear laws existed.

Before taking questions, including dodging answering **Steve Krempasky's** "Batman: Vigilante or hero?" question, he alerted Rotarians to his responsibility of carrying forward matters which may greatly pre-date his office, notably lobbying the state Parole Board on an upcoming parole review of a case dating back to 1969.

Raffle: No one claimed the winning ticket in the raffle so the proceeds went to the Polio Fund.
