This week's meeting:

Attorney Charles C. Keller is well-known for both his skill as a lawyer and his wide-ranging community service.

A 1947 Summa Cum Laude graduate of California State College (now California University of Pennsylvania), Mr. Keller received that institution's highest undergraduate honor - the Distinguished Service Award. He was also elected to Phi Sigma Pi and Pi Gamma Mu, honorary fraternities. Mr. Keller then attended the Law School of the University of Pittsburgh, receiving his Juris Doctor degree in 1949. There he was a member of the Phi Delta Phi fraternity.

Mr. Keller served as President of the Pennsylvania Bar Association from 1982 to 1983, and as a member of its Board of Governors for six years. A member of the Washington County, Pennsylvania and American Bar Associations, Mr. Keller in 1963 received the Washington County Bar Association's highest honor - the Distinguished Service Award - and in 1965, served as its President. He served in the American Bar Association House of Delegates from 1981 through 1984. Elected a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers in 1987, Mr. Keller is also a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation and the Pennsylvania Bar Foundation. He served as editor and publisher of the Washington County Reports for 22 years, from 1959 to 1981. He currently serves as a Trustee of the Washington County Bar Foundation.

Mr. Keller is perhaps best known for his involvement with Rotary International. A member of the Board of Directors of Rotary International in 1974-1976, and in 1986-1988, Mr. Keller served as President of Rotary International in 1987-88. He served as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International, and as its Chairman in 1992-93. He has been a member of the Rotary Club of California, Pennsylvania, since 1950.

Mr. Keller served as a pilot in the United States Army Air Corps in the ETO Theater in WWII. He retired after 30 years of service from the United States Air Force as a Judge Advocate with the rank of Lt. Colonel.

President Gary offered a special recognition to **Bill Cost** and **Dan Coffman** for their help with the Career Fair.

Special Presentation: President Gary Baker presented a check in the amount of \$10,000 to Newark High School's "A Call to College." The check was accepted by Diane DeLawder, **Sarah Wallace**, and Michelle Brasseur. Sarah Wallace spoke about how this check will go a long way in helping many local youths attend college. For every \$1,000 donated \$14,000 is generated through other scholarship funds.



Sergeant at arms: Patrick Jeffries fined several Rotarians this week.

Program: Rotarian Chris Meyer introduced our speaker Professor Randall Buchman, who spoke on Ohio's role in electing Abraham Lincoln.

Buchman started his presentation with how Lincoln's view on slavery was not well accepted and felt his popularity was not strong enough to get him nominated by the Republican party, so he was ready to bow out and go back to work as a lawyer. Lincoln's view was to end the spread of slavery and let it die a natural death.

On November 15th, 1859, an article appeared in the Sandusky, Ohio, newspaper about the occurrence of a large rally supporting Lincoln for President in Mansfield, Ohio. This turned out to be a hoax written by the editor of the Sandusky newspaper. Henry Cook was not happy with Ohio's governor Salmon Chase, a presidential candidate.

This sparked Lincoln to maybe reconsider and when asked to speak in Columbus and Cincinnati by Cook he accepted. Lincoln spoke about how our founding fathers did not want slavery. His views were very different from the Democratic nominee Stephen Douglas.

Lincoln was to speak in New York at what he thought was going to be a smaller venue, but because of natural damage to the building it was moved to the Cooper Union building a much larger place where more people were able to listen to him speak. Again he spoke about how we need to do the right thing and end slavery. He quoted: "Let us have faith that right makes might, and in that faith, let us, to the end, dare to do our duty as we understand it." Lincoln again pointed out our founding fathers were against slavery and we need to stand firm and slavery will stop to exist. Buchman believes Lincoln made up his mind to run for president traveling though Ohio with a stop in Defiance, on his way to Chicago for the national Republican convention, held at the Wigwam.

At the Chicago convention, the Ohio delegation changed four of its votes at the last minute to help nominate Lincoln as their party's nominee for president.

During the election it was the first time Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, and Ohio all voted Republican.

Buchman ended his speech by saying that we need to keep the faith in this nation and be grateful we were given the gift of free speech and other properties of a democratic nation.
