Last Week's Meeting

President Jeff Lawyer introduced **Seth Ellington** who delivered the invocation and led members in the Pledge of Allegiance. Past President and song

leader **Tom Slater** directed the group in singing *Blow Out All the Candles* to celebrate January birthdays followed by *How Much is that Doggie in the Window*. (The dog may have had a fee, but the barking Rotarians were priceless!)

President-elect **Gary Baker** called on members for guest introductions: Sharon Fuller was a guest of **Ron Fuller**; Mariah Cherubini was the guest of proud grandpa and PDG, **Bob McGaughy**; Sue Moore and Mary Jo List were guests of **Dave List**; Bob Kent Jr. was a guest of **David Trautman**; Ed Cobb was a Kiwanian guest of **John Weaver**; and the Chamber of Commerce's official groundhog was the distinguished guest of **Cheri Hottinger**.

Cheri reminded the group of the Annual Groundhog Breakfast February 4 at Adena Hall, which will feature keynote speaker OSU President Gordon Gee. There are still tickets available for the event and the doors will open at 5:30 a.m.

Thanks went to **Ed Bohren** and **Mike Greene** for hosting our January student guests. Heath High School senior, Annaleigh McDonald, shared a few words about her Rotary experience and that of fellow student Kelly Roberts, who was out sick. Twin seniors, Tayler and Ty Compton, from Granville High School, also spoke from the podium about their weekly club visits. They were accompanied by GHS Dean of Students Matthew Durst. Guidance Counselor Mackenzie Mathews has attended with the HHS students.

Program:

Ron Fuller introduced the speaker, Lonnie King, who is the 10th Dean of the OSU College of Veterinarian Medicine. His talk, Focus Forward: Charting the Future of Veterinarian Medicine, was definitely eye-opening.

Among the attention-grabbing facts, King noted that all global epidemics in the last 15 years were either originated by, or spread through, animals. These "zoonotic" epidemics included SARs, E. Coli and H1N1. As frightening, King said 60% of all pathogens

have zoonotic origins.

The largest areas of population growth in our world are Asia, Africa and Latin America, which largely contribute to global epidemics as well. "We live in a remarkably interconnected world," King said.

He went on to explain that there is a Triple Threat to our world, resulting from an increasingly vulnerable population, an ever changing environment and an abundance of carrier animals. "There are more people migrating and transporting than any other time in the history of the world," he said.

Individuals consume roughly 200 pounds of meat per year. A concerning statistic is that there are 800 million people living in poverty, which leads to a disproportionate number of poor livestock keepers.

Locally, two-thirds of Ohio households have an animal. A college study found that 53% would risk their life for their pet, and 61% would prefer to talk to their animal than a family member. With this strong human-animal bond, it is not surprising that veterinary medicine has become much more specialized, with orthopedists, oncologists and even behavioral specialists cropping up among 43 recognized veterinary specialties.

It's a "big field, but a small profession," King said, noting there are only 28 veterinarian schools nationally. He added that a vet's role is growing increasingly critical to our world's future safety and well-being. The world is experiencing mass extinction with 50% of plants and animals expected to become extinct in our lifetime due to ecological pollution, according to King. "Bio diversity is responsible to help fend off pathogens from the dilution factor," he said. Biomedical research on animals is also critical to future discoveries of medicines and treatment regimes, he added.

"Our vision is not just to create healthier dogs and cats, but to create a healthier world," King concluded.
