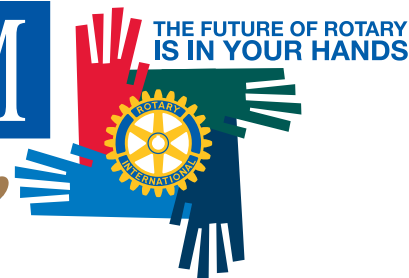

This week's program: Reach Out and Read by Dr. Knobeloch

The Children's Reading Foundation of Licking County is a proud sponsor of the local Reach Out and Read Initiative started by local pediatrician Dr. William Knobeloch, MD.

The mission of the Ohio Reach Out and Read (ROR) program is to make literacy promotion a standard part of pediatric primary care, so that children grow up with books and a love of reading. The ROR model uses the existing structure of pediatric primary care, in which parents of young children have regular, one-on-one, developmentally focused visits with pediatricians during the first years of a child's life. For many families, especially for families living in poverty, these visits are the earliest, and possibly the only, regular contacts with a child development professional. By integrating literacy into well-child visits, pediatricians promote the acquisition of spoken and written language skills in young children, thereby increasing the likelihood of eventual school success. This dialogue between parent and pediatrician provides key literacy knowledge and access to resources for the whole family. The American Academy of Pediatrics endorses ROR as a model for anticipatory guidance from physicians to parents to convey the why and how to share books with children.

Reach Out and Read Ohio (ROR Ohio), founded in 2001 has grown steadily to 104 sites statewide; in 2007 these sites will serve more than 131,000 children and distribute over 230,000 new books. Currently, nearly 2,300 doctors and nurses have been trained in the ROR model of early literacy promotion. ROR sites are presently functioning in community health centers, hospitals, residency programs and pediatric clinics throughout Ohio.

ROR is a three stage approach to promoting literacy in the medical office. Stage 1 is the primary care physician stressing the importance of reading for optimal development. Stage 2 is having a reading focused waiting room with books available and volunteer readers in the office. Stage 3 is the presentation of a new book for every well child visit from age 6 months to age 5 years. Before Kindergarten 10 books will be given to each child.

News and notes:

Shred-It-Day a success: Fred Paetz and Michelle Layman assist with the Shred-It-Day on Saturday in Newark. Our club



helped shred 9,057 pounds paper, the largest the company had done for a community event. Donations are expected to surpass \$1,900. The Newark-Heath club had 13 members plus one volunteer. Newark had 11 members and Granville had one person present.

President **Nelson McCray** opened the meeting and invited **Jim Mitchell** to give the invocation and pledge. **Tom Slater** led the club through "When Rotarians Go Marching In" sung to the tune of "When the Saints Go Marching In."

President **Nelson** made special recognition of **Gib Reese** with a Rotary International award for 50 years of membership in Rotary. **Gib** humbly said, "I don't think I deserve it, but I appreciate it."

President-Elect **Jeff Lawyer** introduced visitors **Jon Befford**, guest of **Donna Carpenter**; **Charles Smith**, guest of **Bill Moore**; and **Tom Lawrence**, grandson and guest of **Charlie Lawrence**.

Student guests were also welcomed again this week. C-TEC students **Paige Ciminello** and **J.R. Walton**, with Principal **Mary Kay Andrews**, were introduced by **Julie Novel**. Bernadette Collins presented the club with a recently-obtained Rotary flag from the Poipu Beach Rotary Club, Koloa, Hawaii.

Tim Schwarm gave his three-minute talk noting his graduation from Granville High School and Ohio University followed, 15 years ago, by a move into the family business. He's the one credited with making "Tri-County Man" for his family-owned Tri-County Chrysler.

Sergeant-at-Arms:

Pat Jeffries quickly fined **Tim Schwarm** for promising to be under three minutes but actually going over five minutes in his talk. Participants in the last weekend's *Twentieth Century Flyer* were fined, including **Dan "Captain Kirk" DeLawder**, **David "Dr. Spock" Trautman** (in absentia), **Tom Marcelain**, **Tom Hall**, and **Gus Pryor** as well as anyone who attended the *Flyer*. Also fined were **Susan Fryer**, **Tom Slater**, **Dick Reed**, **Jack Stickle**, and **Jack O'Neill**. Jack was fined for his contribution in his wife's name to Licking Memorial Hospital in establishing the **Betsy O'Neill Health Resource Center**. **Susan Fryer** then earned a second fine for an untimely cell phone call.

Program:

President **Nelson** remarked on the irony that the regularly-scheduled program was "disrupted by Iceland." **Director Gary Baker** added that **Sonny Akuopha** was grounded by the volcanic

ash cloud impacting Europe but plans to return to the United States in the near future.

Susan Fryer introduced speaker **Luke Messinger**, whose presentation was originally scheduled as the program for May 11. His presentation on Dawes Arboretum was titled "The Best Day to Plant a Tree." **Luke** has been at Dawes since 1987 having been named Executive Director in 2000. He is a fellow Newark Rotarian.

Luke noted his presentation is a program he gives around the country.

Beman and **Bertie Dawes** established an endowment in 1929 with 250 acres. The private, non-profit foundation is established whereby 85% of its funding comes from an endowment.

Now, the Dawes has 1,789 acres, which is expected to grow to 1,849 acres within two weeks. It includes 11 miles of trails and is now a year-round educational programs provider.

"We are a tree museum," **Luke** said, noting that its mission is "trees, history, and nature."

In 2009, the Arboretum saw 241,623 visitors and reached nearly 2,000 members. Among 200+ volunteers were honorary Dawes trustees **Gib Reese** and **Don Gunnerson**.

Luke reviewed some changes coming to the grounds. A woodland garden featured Ohio trees that are threatened is in the works, a "stumpery" which is new to North America is planned, a proposed new history center could see construction begin this Fall, and the Ohio Valley Native Plant Initiative led by **Dawes** to get seeds with true, Ohio genetics in the hands of area nurseries.

He highlighted progress on some recent additions. Arboretum East has been converted to conservation agriculture in future hopes of a new forest emerging. **Martin Farm**, which was the original Daweswood Farm until sold off during the Great Depression, was bought back by **Dawes** a few years ago and also converted to a conservation agriculture approach.

Dutchfork Wetlands is now four years removed from being a cornfield. The project, initiated to mitigate wetlands impacted by the ODOT 161/37/16 project, has been a success and highlights the path from here to the Gulf of Mexico that water flows. The educational aspect of the wetlands are being realized. For example, **Lakewood Schools'** students are learning environmental science at **Dawes** as a regular part of their curriculum.

Luke talked about the "Power Plants" initiative which will start soon adjacent west of the Visitor Center. The garden will include 14 Ohio crops grown for technological use in biomass and biofuels.

Luke described **Dawes'** role as an outdoor alternative to combat the "videophilia" phenomenon that has seen the first-ever decline in purchase of bikes and the first-in-20-years decline in sports participation.

Remarking on the Story Trail as well as other collaborations with the Columbus Zoo, Licking County Food Pantry, and Licking Memorial Hospital, **Luke** encouraged more collaboration and concluded, "Think of **Dawes** as your big back yard." Numerous and lively questions followed.
