This week's Meeting: Licking County Soil & Water Conservation District

In 1944, Licking County land owners petitioned the state of Ohio to create the Licking County Soil & Water Conservation District (LCSWCD). Local districts were created to partner with state and federal agencies in order to assist land owners in conserving natural resources. In the early years, programs focused on helping farmers reduce excessive soil erosion. As the county's land use changed, additional programs focused on protecting all natural resources.

LCSWCD and its five-member board of supervisors provide leadership through strategic planning, partnerships and conservation programs. Partners include the federal Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources and Licking County government. The district provides technical assistance to farmers, reviews construction plans for urban development, and oversees the county drainage maintenance program.

The district provides extensive K-12 education programs to schools and summer camps. It hosts field days, FFA soil judging, and envirothon competitions, and provides educational programs for the Natural Resources Area at the Hartford Fair. The district provides information to hundreds of individuals requesting assistance each year.

The landscape of Licking County is changing. Owners of the land are changing, use of the land is changing, and technology is changing. As these changes occur, the district feels it is vital that soil and water resources are conserved and sustained. The district encourages everyone to use these resources wisely for the benefit of this generation and future generations.

President **Gary Baker** brought the meeting to order at 12:10 and asked attendees to recite the Rotary 4-Way Test.

Jerry Jackson offered the invocation and led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Tom Slater led us in "Going to Rotary" to honor our guest, **District Governor Brent Rosenthal**.

President-Elect **Laura Lewis** introduced the visiting Rotarians: **Bart Mahoney** ('12-'13 District Governor) of the Whitehall Club and **John Pattison** (Asst. District Governor) of the Zanesville Daybreak Club. Other guests included Patricia McGaughy, guest of Robert McGaughy, Mike Denman, guest of Tom Slater, and Cory Wills, guest of Jeff Lawyer.

Announcements:

Jeff Lawyer shared that a good time was enjoyed by the 20 participants in the Scioto Downs night last week.

Everyone was also reminded of the Rotary Family Picnic planned for Sept. 13 at Dawes Arboretum and visit from Ohio State President Gordon Gee planned for Oct. 25. Gary Baker assured the Rotarians that they will fit as many tables as possible into the room.

Club Historian **Steve Ehret** presented books of Rotograms to Past-Presidents **Nelson McCray** and **Jeff Lawyer** so that they could peruse the Rotograms from their year of service.

Gary Baker welcomed new member **Gary Baldwin**. He shared that Gary is already a Paul Harris Fellow and been recognized for special projects in previous Rotary Clubs. Ed Bohren was Gary's sponsor. District Governor Rosenthal placed the new member pin on Gary, and Gary was welcomed with a warm applause.

Sergeant-at-Arms **Pat Jeffries** levied fines for good deeds on **Doug Ute, Doug Mills, Dick Reed, Gary Baker, Ed Bohren** and **Bob Kent**. **Michele Layman, Mike Shearer** (twice) and **Tony Adams** also paid fines. And Pat auctioned a pair of tickets to the upcoming OSU football game, and Dick Reed was highest bidder.

Program:

President Baker introduced our new District Governor Brent Rosenthal. Gary stated that while we all had seen Brent's biography in our Rotogram, he felt it was important to note that Sylvia, Brent's wife, had recently raised over 4,500 pounds of

food for the Columbus Food Pantry.

Brent began his presentation by sharing how much respected the breadth and depth of leadership at the Newark Rotary Club as well as the vision for the future of the club. He also shares several interesting anecdotes about various Newark Club members.



Brent then began to share the vision of Kalyan Banerjee, Rotary International's new President. Rotary will focus on three things: Family & Home, Continuity and Change. Kalyan's belief is that if we bring humanity into the family and home, it will gradually grow out into the community and begin to affect change in the community. Continuity refers to the idea that we should continue to do projects that are having a positive effect on society like the war on polio and poverty. Rotary has made significant strides in eradicating polio and coming close to fulfilling our goal. It is critical that we continue this. Finally, Change refers to the need to identify new needs and be willing to accommodate those changes. Kalyan has referenced a quote by Mahatma Gandhi that "you must be the change that you wish to see in the world." As members of Rotary, we are all challenged to apply this attitude both within our clubs and in our communities.

Clubs are encouraged to consider the needs of their members, especially new members, as well as the needs of communities. Clubs should be open to trying different formats and trying new ideas. Clubs should operate independently of each other.

Kalyan's desire is to strengthen clubs so that they can more thoroughly serve communities. He is specifically challenging each club to do at least three service projects to alleviate hunger in the coming year. Eleanor Roosevelt was quoted as saying "the more we help others, the more we help ourselves." Although Rotary International is global in scope, we still need to be local in touch so that we can help our communities.

Brent then shared an example of how Rotary helps local communities with scholarships. Members at the McConnelsville Club sought to track down past scholarship recipients. Brent read a letter from a woman whose life was brought out of poverty and was greatly impacted by both a Rotary Exchange in Mexico and later a Rotary Scholarship. She shared how she was inspired by traveling and living in a foreign country, then with the assistance from a Rotary Scholarship was able to attend The Ohio State University. She is currently a teacher in the Cincinnati area. With such a moving story, she shared her deepest appreciation to the Rotary Club of McConnelsville.
