This week's Meeting: About Dawes Arboretum

Inspired by their love for trees and nature, Beman and Bertie Dawes founded The Dawes Arboretum on their Licking County, Ohio, property in 1929. Beman had worked in the family lumber industry as a young man, and as his passion for and knowledge of trees grew, so did his desire to share what he had learned with the public. As a self-taught naturalist and gardener, Bertie also was eager to educate others about the natural world. Their collaborative efforts inspired the creation of The Dawes Arboretum.

There are more than 15,000 living plants on The Arboretum's grounds, and most are hardy in central Ohio. Of these plants, 4,500 are unique names (taxa). Records kept for each plant include specific location, scientific and common names, origin and age.

Be sure to visit the Japanese Garden, Cypress Swamp, Deep Woods, Beech and Buckeye Collections, Magnolias, Rare Tree Collection and the Conifer Glen. All of these areas and more can be located easily on a visitor map.

Program:

Tom Cummiskey introduced the speaker, **Cheri Hottinger**. Cheri serves as the President of the Licking County Chamber of Commerce, a position she has held since 2004. Prior to that time she served as a member of the Chamber Board for three years. In addition, Cheri serves on the CCEO Board of Directors (Chamber of Commerce Executives of Ohio), The Works and is a member of the Development Council for Licking Memorial Hospital. She was named as Chamber Professional of the Year by the CCEO in February of 2010. Prior to taking the position at the Chamber, Cheri served as Treasurer for the Jay Company, Inc. an Electrical contractor, owned and operated by the Hottinger family. She also served on Newark City Council from 2000 – 2003 and ran unsuccessfully for Mayor of the City of Newark in 2003. Cheri, her husband Jay and three daughters reside in

Newark. Cheri is a member of the Newark Rotary.

Cheri's presentation started with an overview of economic development in Licking County. One difficulty in Licking County development is that there are many players involved and while this is fine internally it leads to confusion externally. Current players include groups from local, county, regional, state, private developers and all of us. This is difficult for companies looking to come into Licking County. Some of the current programs available in our county include Workonomics, 79|Seventy, and the R&E Taskforce.

Workonomics strives to partner economic developers and workforce developers and looks at both the human resource needs of companies as well as the current available workforce. Part of the goal is to track and fill gaps and to let potential industry know of the workforce available here.

79|Seventy strives to provide a combined marketing plan for all manufacturing in the 79|Seventy corridor. The R&E Task Force works with existing industry not only to bring expansions, but also to retain industry. By partnering with the Chamber, the goal is to develop relationships with businesses and resolve local issues at a local level.

The exciting news of the day though was the announcement of a new partnership of the Chamber and Licking County Commissioners, the Community Improvement Corporation (CIC). The sole purpose of this group is to create jobs in Licking County. It will be a county-wide effort to partner private industry with economic development. It will be a 501(C)(3) corporation governed by a 15-member Board of Directors. The CIC will contract with the Licking County Chamber to provide day to day oversight. The CIC has a budget projection of \$750,000 for the first three years and, to date, nearly \$500,000 has been pledged.

Cheri said the budget will include adding a "dedicated person for economic development" and, later, added hiring a person "with the experience and contacts already" to do the job. She indicated the budget afforded conducting a "huge marketing campaign."

Why is this important? It is important because as a county we need: a unified approach to economic development, transparency & accountability, to stop confusion, and pool resources. The bottom line though is we need to create more jobs in Licking County! Congratulations and thanks to everyone who has worked to make this partnership happen.

President Gary thanked Cheri and informed the group that the Newark Rotary was donating \$100 to assist the new CIC.
